Thoughts From Dave

Recently, I was asked to speak on the role partnerships play in global missions. In preparation, I reflected on the biblical meaning of partnerships as highlighted in Philippians. Paul used the Greek word "koinonia" three times in the book and it is alternatively translated "fellowship" and

"partnership". In other words, there is an unbreakable connection between fellowship and partnerships.

John Stott once wrote that "koinonia" involves "something we share in together" – a common faith in the triune God, "someway we serve together" - common works of service, and the "somehow of life together" - sharing of common life. Paul's letter to the Philippians weaves these three themes into a seamless tapestry of Christ-centered partnership. It's a beautiful sight to see.

Partnerships For Training Pastors encapsulates Stott's description. We partner with Majority World churches, Theological Institutions,

missionaries, and mission organizations in order to serve less-resourced pastors and church leaders. Since July 2014, Joyce and I continue to marvel at God's gracious development of global mission partnerships. January Trip to Uganda

"Fast and fruitful" is a description of my first ministry trip in 2016. Spending only twelve days in Uganda required non-stop movement to Oyam and Masaka as well as spending specific time developing ministry resources in Kampala. God helped all the partners maximize our available time.

Traveling to **Oyam** always reminds me of the rich cultural diversity found in Uganda. This region is still recovering from the horrendous impact of the Lord's Resistance Army reign of terror. Add to that reality a large influx of refugees from neighboring countries and one can imagine the economic and spiritual challenges facing our brothers and sisters. Yet, God's people are resilient and Christ's church is growing in this region.

Our team's task was to teach pastors and church leaders from the Old Testament book of Exodus as well as consider the role of governance in church ministry. Working our way through the Pentateuch establishes a lens through which one sees how Christ fulfills the Old Testament. In addition, seeing God's plan for shared church leadership provides an impetus to move away from the "big man" approach to ministry leadership. It was a good visit and we will return to Oyam in April for more teaching and mentoring.

The **Masaka** training session yielded a record turn-out. Pastors and church leaders from 25 churches gathered together and experienced the "fellowship and partnership" of the gospel. A variety of teaching methods highlighted our study of 1 & 2 Samuel and 1 Kings 1-11. Large group and smaller

break-out sessions yielded exceptional interaction and thoughtful responses. As we studied these historical books a clear contrast appeared between Saul, David and Solomon's approach to the spiritual leadership of God's people.

Despite his exceptional God-given natural abilities, Saul was driven by his own agenda and ended his life by his own hand. David is described as a "man after God's heart" and his life illustrated a deep understanding of God's holy and sovereign ways, which is especially illustrated in his Psalm 51 prayer after egregious sins. Solomon began well but ended badly as he foolishly disregarded God's holy purposes.

Life-changing leadership principles also were applied around the topics of worship, mission, youth ministry and leadership. Pastor Abel, of Kinoni Baptist Church, and Kampala Baptist Church leaders led discussion groups covering these topics and resulted in much affirmation for the value of these ministry principles in their church settings.

Special appreciation goes to Bethel Grove Bible Church in Ithaca, NY for providing the operational funds for this annual four day event. With their help, the participants returned home with greater insight into how the Bible fits together around the gospel of Jesus Christ.
