Daudi Nkuggwa is the “on-the-ground” coordinator of our Ugandan training projects and is the leader of Kampala Baptist Church’s Missions Committee. Daudi and his wife Marion, along with their children, live in Kampala. Marion runs a restaurant and catering business that has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown. Daudi checks in with Training of Trainers Project (TOT) members and writes: *“I thank God for the trainings that we had with these guys. Indeed, they have helped these guys a great deal in this season.”*

The following paragraphs are snippets of his several conversations with TOT participants.

Edson and his wife Jennifer live in the Masaka Region. They are busy doing worship at home with their family on Sunday and thereafter Edson goes to check on the believers by encouraging them to study God’s Word and also pray for them with his associate. They are using the TOT material and it is very useful.



Ronald (Central Region) – I had a chat with him to find out how he was progressing in this season and he said they are using radio stations and their phones to connect with their congregation that is scattered all over their community. (Daudi) gave him tips on how to visit church members and do Bible study and also encourage them to do worship services with their families. In other words, be creative and use wisely the TOT materials.



Francis (Oyam South – lower left in picture)) – I spoke to Francis and he was very upbeat. They are happy and busy in the rainy season planting and weeding their crops. They also have enough food to survive on. About ministry, they conduct worship services in their homes and thereafter visit the church members to pray with them and encourage them through the season. They are using TOT materials and they are working well for them.

Mike Nam (Oyam North – upper center in picture) – They do worship in their different homes and thereafter go visiting on their bicycles to have Bible study with church members in the nearby villages. They are security conscious (health wise) as they visit families but so far, they have been successful. The challenge is that of transport visiting members who live far away from the church.



Partner Update

Peru - Language, Literacy and Life with Dr. Diana Weber - May 19th was the scheduled Pastor’s Training for Quechua speaking pastors in Huánuco region. Felix, the man heading the pastoral training team, received a call from one of the Quechua pastors reporting that 20 pastors were very disappointed they could not meet due to the Peruvian lockdown order. Large groups will not be permitted to meet for some time, so it appears that November may be the next time pastoral training groups can meet. Currently, the team is preparing “training packages”, with a video on “Who is the Holy Spirit? and brief teaching for cell phone distributions (no smart phones in mountains). Diana reports that the team’s creativity is amazing. We are providing \$1,500 to help them prepare the material, do the dubbing of videos into Quechua, and produce training material. **Keep Felix, the team, and Drs. David and Diana Weber in your prayers.**
