We are grateful for God's continual infusions of encouragement and grace that keep us going during the limitations of this year-long pandemic.



Kiboga Vision Casting Visit – February 16-18

As part of the 2020-2024 Ugandan Emerging Leaders Project, this visit introduced the idea of training a new generation of leaders to existing pastors in a section of Uganda's Central Region. Pastor Andrew Mwenge, Daudi Nkuggwa, and Ronald Walyemira -one of our Trainer Trainees – made the visit. Though well received, they discovered many challenges facing church ministry in the Kiboga region and offered ideas on how to continue into the future.

The Challenges - 1) Most of the pastors lack theological training; which affects the depth of what they preach and teach to their congregations. 2) These churches are predominately of one tribe with a language which is not used in the local community. This has affected growth and outreach. 3) Most of these churches are meeting in makeshift places and are chased from place to place. One attendee said, "No one is willing to join us when we don't have a permanent structure. Everyone comes here one Sunday, disappears and never returns." 4) Teaching and mentoring Emerging Leaders in these circumstances is an uphill task as there are no activities to draw young people for the building of relationships. 5) The team was told that the Christians who come to these churches need to be encouraged in keeping their commitments.



The Next Steps - Several recommendations include: keep offering training events for pastors and invite identified young leaders. Pray that the continued

focused training will open and widen new doors for outreach ministry so that the churches are encourage and strengthen in this region. *Please pray with us for wisdom on how best to continue training in Kiboga*.

Back to Tororo February 23-25 - Last March, the team left Kampala for Emerging Leaders Training in this new area east of the Nile River. While there, the government shut down everything. It wasn't until October and November that two more training events could be offered in Tororo. Last week, Pastor Andrew, Daudi, Elisha, and Maria returned to provide the fourth



Seminar. The team was pleased by the receptivity of the participants. *Pray for Tororo's Emerging Leaders and churches in that Region.*

Technology Update

Through the generous 2020 year-end gifts, progress is being made in upgrading our tech options for pastoral training. The first installment of \$4,500 was sent to the Uganda team to purchase sound equipment, a mobile generator, mobile speakers, wireless mics, projector screen, computer tablets for 7 Training of Trainers students, and in-studio filming equipment for Kampala curriculum development.

A second installment of \$4,500 will be sent in March for the purchase of a Canon 6D Mark 11 Camera, a new projector, and I Mac computer for editing, along with camera and sound cards for recording in Kampala's studio. With these purchases, virtual training, blogs, podcasts, as well as sermons from Kampala Baptist Church will be made available through virtual connections across Uganda. **Pray for these connections and ask the Lord to guide the use of each piece of equipment for the development of God's people in Uganda**.

The picture on the right tells the story regarding tech updates in Mechanicsburg. The purchase of a video camera, wireless mic, and necessary studio equipment will enhance the training capacity from our home. We're grateful that Cory, a twenty-



something techie from our local church, helped identify what we need for effective virtual training. Join us in praying that this equipment will be used wisely for the growth of global leaders.
